Attendance and communication - why it is so important!

As we continue through our second week of Term 2, nearly into our third, I would like to discuss the importance of attendance. We do have students that have returned to school as well as students still learning from home. A number of parents have been in to see me and asked the question – what should I do?

My answer has always been this. Our Premier has openly directed, that for the time being, the safest place for your children to be is at home with you, isolating. Schools, are open for those parents who are unable to care for or, support their children in their learning. The decision – to come to school or work from home - is not mine to make. The right decision is the one you make for your family.

For these reasons and more, maintaining regular attendance and communicating regularly with the school is as important now as ever. Please know we are carefully tracking student attendance, even for those back at school. It might help if families understood the attendance classifications we use. Specifically because of the nature of learning in a pandemic:

If a student is at school, attendance is identified as Present and in Class.

If a student is at home, returning work and we know an effort is being made with the learning, then they are identified as Present – Learning at Home – Participating.

If a student is at home, families have asked for work but nothing has come back or nobody has attempted to talk to teachers etc, students are identified as Present – Learning at Home – Not participating.

If the school has attempted to get confirmation from a parent if a student will be attending or use online packs, and had no response, attendance is identified as Absent – Unexplained / Unauthorised.

Where a student has returned to school this term then been absent with no communication with the school this is recorded as Unauthorised and Unexplained. We have several of these cases at the moment.

Regular ongoing attendance and open communication between home and school is so important in ensuring a strong education that sets your child up for success in life. Abble to make the life choices they want to make because they've had the education they need. As opposed to having to make life based decisions because they have to and because they haven't got the education, skills and knowledge they need.

UPSIDE DOWN CAKE WITH CARAMELISED APPLE

2 Lrg Apples peeled & sliced 5mm rings

60 gms Butter I/2 Brown Sugar

I tsp Cinnamon 2tbl Coconut

1/3 cup SR Flour 1/4 cup Sugar

1/3 cup Milk 4 Eggs Separated



METHOD:

- Preheat oven to 180C fan forced.
- Peel & core apples, slice into 5mm rings.
- Melt butter in a frying pan or saucepan to cover bottom of pan, add brown sugar & cinnamon cook stirring until sugar dissolves. Remove from heat, place apple rings on top of caramel in the pan return to heat cook covered over low heat for 2 minutes.
- Uncover cook for a further 5 minutes or until apples are tender, remove from heat.
- Place apples & caramel in a round cake tin.
- Combine, flour, milk & egg yolks in a medium bowl.
- Whisk egg whites in a glass or metal bowl with a electric mixer until soft peaks form. Gradually add sugar until dissolved between additions.
- Fold egg white mixture into flour mixture, in 2 batches. Spread over apples. Bake for 12 minutes or until cooked in the centre.
- Turn onto a serving plate & sprinkle with coconut.

This is for the students at home to try to make.

Cooking with Brigette this week we made Caramel upside down cake.




On Tuesday afternoon Class 2 had a lesson about Tessellations.



About the Challenge

10 books in 10 weeks

Students from Prep to Year 6 are challenged to make reading a part of their day and read 10 books in 10 weeks. They can negotiate with their teacher to have a large chapter book counted as being more than one book. Whilst reading 10 books means the student has completed the Challenge, they can read more. Extra pages can be downloaded to add to the reading log.

What can I read?

You are free to choose which fiction or non-fiction books to read for the Challenge.

Larger chapter books can be counted as more than one book - please talk to your teacher about how many chapters or pages can be counted as "one book".
