Keeping our school community safe!

As government restrictions ease and all students return to school next week, it is an opportunity to share with you how we will be working in a COVID19 aware world.

In line with government health recommendations, students are now able to use school playground equipment. We have instigated a cleaning regime before and after play times to ensure all equipment is safe for student use.

We will continue the extra cleaning routines in and around classrooms, bathrooms and school spaces generally. We have a ready supply of soap and hand sanitiser in all learning spaces and will continue to impress upon children the importance of maintaining good hygiene practices.

It is clear from medical advice that social distancing amongst students is not as critical as social distancing between adults. As a result of this, teachers will continue to encourage students to be sensible about personal space and ensure they understand why this is so important.

I would like to thank parent and community members who have worked with us this last week to 'stop briefly at school, drop children off and go again' ensuring adult visitors to our site are minimal. Please know we keep a visitor log of all visitors to our school and can ensure children are not being exposed to other adults who may be working on site. This includes all contractors.

In amongst all of this is the important message that everyone has an obligation to practice — if you are not well, even if you have the slightest of symptoms, don't come to school, get tested, self isolate and help us to look after everyone! This will be even more important as we move in to the 'flu season.'

Please know we will continue to do everything we need to, to keep our school community safe. If you have any concerns or worries please feel free to contact the school office and make an appointment to come in and discuss your concerns. Your children's safety is our priority!

PHYSICAL DISTANCING IN SCHOOLS DURING COVID-19

Public Health advice is clear – it is safe for schools to be open. This is because we have a low rate of Coronavirus (COVID-19) community spread in Tasmania and there has been increased and expanded testing. To reduce the risk even further, schools have hygiene and physical distancing measures in place.

While it is safe to send your child/ren to school, we still need adults to maintain a distance from other adults, whilst on site.

To help us with adult physical distancing, we are asking all parents/carers to:

Minimise the time you are on site of a morning when delivering children to school. Stop, drop and go is a term being used at other schools.

Make contact with the school by (teachers, principal, ancillary staff) telephone/email if you need to speak to us. Depending on your need, we may invite you in to school for a meeting where personal distancing can be facilitated.

We want to make school as safe as possible for everyone. Feel free to ask questions if you require any further information. These things won't be forever, but we all have a shared responsibility to act in a way that supports everyone being safe.

On Friday afternoon Class I and Class 2 combined for their regular STEM rotations, which involved Cooking, Gardening and technology. One group was involved in designing their own Marble Maze. They were given set materials to use like boxes, tape, straws, scissors and of course marbles. To help out the younger children we paired them with older children. Before everyone could get started they had to work together to capture their design down on a piece of paper. They all loved being able being in control of their own design and being able to share their ideas with one another.

Bothwell District School Farm Revitalisation Program

Students at BDS have been working very hard during term two. Mr O'Toole put students that are in his option line and that are with him on a Tuesday and Thursday to work.

We had to use a spade and shovel to 'spade' the holes that had been dug with an auger.

When the auger drills the holes, it can glaze the surface which can stop the tree roots from spreading resulting in the tree becoming root bound at the base. Because of this the plant isn't getting enough nutrients and moisture and they will eventually die.

Last week students started to lay out the irrigation pipe. They connected the pipes to each other.

When it has been too wet to go outside we have been looking at other types of plants and fruits to grow. We have come up with different types like strawberries, raspberries, freesias, potatoes, saffron, garlic, button mushrooms and radishes.

The on going development of the school farm has been a great achievement so far that all the school, teachers and students can be proud of.

Mr O'Toole is always keeping everyone in the right place and on track.

CHUNKY CHOCOLATE CHIP COOKIES

125 gm Butter softened I Egg

I tsp Vanilla Essence I cup Plain Flour

1/4 cup SR Flour 1/2 tsp Bi-Carb Soda

1/3 cup Cocoa Powder 1/2 M &M''s

1/2 cup Choc Bits 1/4 cups Brown Sugar




METHOD

- Pre-heat oven to moderate 180 degrees, fan forced oven.
- Beat butter, vanilla essence, sugar & egg in small bowl with an electric mixer until smooth(do not over mix).
- Mix the sifted dry ingredients into the butter & egg mixture.
- Add the choc bits & M & Ms.
- Place level teaspoons of the mixture onto oven trays, allow
 5cm between each cookie.
- Bake in oven for about 10 minutes. Leave on tray to cool for 5 minutes before transferring to a cake cooler.

Class Four engaged in a cloze reading scavenger hunt around the school recently. They had a Banjo Patterson poem to read with words missing from the poem. Working in pairs, they had to follow clues to work out the location of the missing words scattered around the school. Once they located the word they had to run back and tell their partners who then filled in the gap in the poem. They were then given the next clue. Students were having fun, out of the classroom, being physical while practicing their reading comprehension skills.






Kinder/Prep
