#### Studying Year 11 & 12 at Bothwell District High School

There have been some excellent conversations occurring behind the scenes of late as part of the preparation for extending our school to include Year 11 & 12 from the beginning of next year. Department representatives from Facility Services have visited. We conducted a full site inspection and considered what opportunities exist for housing Years 11 & 12 as a separate part of our school. It is recognised that as a part of growing up and acknowledging the maturity of Senior Secondary students, it is important that they have a place to work and "an identity" all of their own. Studying becomes more of a personal responsibility and the opportunity to come and go from the school is important. Access to parking spaces for those students driving to and from school is also considered.

It has been recognised that our current school buildings are not particularly suitable as they are, and a significant amount of work needs to be done in this area. We look forward to hearing more about this as proposals are forth coming.

Mr O'Toole will take on the responsibility for the day to day operation of our 11/12 students next year in cooperation with another teacher. For now, he and I have been working very hard on learning provision — that is, what subjects will be offered to our students. It is my commitment that students who study at Bothwell will be given the opportunity to study the subjects they want to study — just as students in other school and colleges do. We plan to work closely with other schools and colleges in the area as well as local industry to support our students to be 'work ready' when they finish Year 12. We are currently exploring 2/3 different options for how that could look.

I've been talking to our current students, have shared with them some of the planning and have asked them to consider, quite seriously what subjects they would like to study, regardless of where they end up studying. One of the keys to success at this level is motivated and engaged students and we'll achieve this by ensuring that students are doing what they need and want to be doing. At the moment, surprisingly enough, they are still quite hesitant and not too sure of things.

This is a very exciting development for education in the Central Highlands, I look forward to working with families and community members to ensure that it is the best it can possibly be!

The power of heads can turn.


The power of people, can create a team
















## **CURRANT AND JAM SLICE**

I Cup SR Flour

90 gm Butter

2 tsp Milk( approximately)

TOPPING:

60 GM Butter I tsp Vanilla Essence

1/3 cup Sugar 3/4 cup SR Flour

1/4 cup Milk 3/4 cup Currants

2 Eggs I/3 cup Raspberry Jam

ICING:

1 1/2 CUPS Icing Sugar

2tbl Hot Water

60 gm Butter



### **METHOD:**

- 1.Grease and lined tin 19cm x 29 cm slice tin.
- 2. Sift flour into a bowl, rub in butter, add enough milk to make the ingredients cling together.
- 3 Knead gently on a lightly floured surface until smooth.
- 4.Roll dough large enough to cover the base of the tin.
- 5. Spread with jam, sprinkle currants over top.
- 6. Spread topping on top of the currants.
- 7. Cream butter, essence and sugar in a small bowl with an electric beater until fluffy, add eggs, stir in flour and milk.
- 8.Bake in moderate oven for about 25 minutes. Cool, when cold spread with icing cut when icing is set.

Sift icing sugar into bowl stir in butter and enough water to make a smooth paste, can also leave not iced.

Click & Collect — Wednesday 10th June,2020.




We are excited that Bothwell Library is now offering Click & Collect. Here's how you use it:
